
Murihiku Regeneration

- Established by Hokonui Rūnanga
- Represents Southern Māori (Hapū)
- Is about the regeneration of Murihiku/Southland to support future generations
- Is working for local and national interests
- Is open to *partnering* with research institutions – nationally and internationally

Tiwai Aluminium Smelter – catalyst for change

Murihiku Regeneration was triggered by the closure announcement of the Aluminium Smelter at Tiwai, and associated *community impact*

Objective: to ensure that the social and economic upheaval that occurred during the economic restructuring of the 1980s/90s *is not repeated*





Social Regeneration Plan


To provide a social / cultural / environmental regenerative kaupapa for Murihiku/Southland

- 3. He Ao Hou New Futures Murihiku






Te Ara Aukati
